As Director of the Carrie M. McLain Memorial Museum, I oversee all administrative duties including management of our \$400,000 annual budget, 3 FT staff and seasonal PT staff, contractors, operations, donor relations, programs, grants, and reporting. I also serve as the main curator, researching and writing on material culture items in the collection in partnership with Alaska Native knowledge bearers and community members. As the exhibits lead, I work with community members and artists to organize and co-curate exhibitions and plan related outreach activities. As the collections manager, I oversee the acquisition, registration, cataloguing, housing, records, and inventories of approximately 20,000 historical and cultural objects, 35,000 original photographs, and 400 linear feet of archival materials. Over the past seven years, I have worked with over 140 donors and grown our collection by 1,500 material culture items and works of art. Fostering and nurturing longitudinal relationships with Indigenous community members, organizations, schools, and donors is a critical aspect of this position.

New Museum Project Management: From 2015 to 2017, I served as project director for the new Carrie M. McLain Memorial Museum inside the 18,000 SF Richard Foster Building in Nome. The project began with leading a comprehensive inventory of our collections, which were spread across seven facilities. A tight project timeline required relocating from the old museum during construction of the new facility, which includes two exhibit galleries, a collections range, conservation lab, research room, and other support spaces. Along with new facility management, I served as project manager for our inaugural exhibition *Nome: Hub of Cultures and Communities Across the Bering Strait*, managed the \$1.2M budget with our design and fabrication team, and served as chief curator and writer.

During my dissertation studies at Arizona State University, I co-taught undergraduate and graduate courses in Native American art, Italian art, and Art of the 20th century. I also served as a guest lecturer for hands-on workshops researching material culture in museum collections.

PROJECT PARTNERSHIPS WITH INDIGENOUS COMMUNITY MEMBERS

2021- Connecting Cultural Collections and Communities across the Bering Strait

Present (Collections Digitization Project and Indigenous Knowledge Program)

A project supported by an Institute of Museum and Library Services CARES Act Grant (CAGML-248165-OMLS-21). The Carrie M. McLain Memorial Museum is creating an interactive eMuseum that increases access to cultural resources for indigenous stakeholders in Nome and Bering Strait communities. The adaptation of a collections management system will support multiple forms of digital media that link to the eMuseum, featuring over 2,000 objects from the collection. Culture and language specialists representing Inupiaq and St. Lawrence Island Yupik knowledge bearers are providing information to update catalog records, resulting in a rich assemblage of content including object photographs, oral histories, and traditional knowledge. Two student interns from the University of Alaska will be participating in hands-on training in collections handling and data management in addition to gaining experience working with cultural and language specialists and documenting traditional knowledge. Community and classroom presentations and information on social media are being planned that will familiarize target audiences with the eMuseum and its resources.

2020- Stronger Together: Bering Strait Communities Respond to the COVID-19 Pandemic

Present (Museum Exhibition and Publication)

Stronger Together is a multi-component museum-community program that encompasses an oral history project, artwork initiative, museum exhibit and book, and set of online resources. The book features contributions from 51 community members and artists from across the Bering Strait region with oral histories, artwork, and poetry that reflect and respond to the COVID-19 pandemic. Community member stories offer insight into personal experiences and challenges encountered during the pandemic from cancellation of the Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race and loss of tourism to the celebrated arrival of air freight and vaccines. Artist narratives speak to the work they created for the project as well as shifts in the art world during the past two years. The exhibition and publication prioritize first-person narratives and offer a nuanced look into the lived experiences of Bering Strait community members during the COVID-19 pandemic.

2019- Nome: Hub of Cultures and Communities across the Bering Strait (Museum Present Publication)

A collaborative publication featuring historical objects and artwork from the main exhibit at the Carrie M. McLain Memorial Museum. The catalog features object histories, community essays, oral histories, and historical and contemporary photographs.

2018-2021 Our Stories Etched in Ivory (Indigenous Knowledge Project and Publication)

A project undertaken in partnership with the Smithsonian Arctic Studies Center, Carrie M. McLain Memorial Museum, and 40 Inupiag and Yup'ik community members. Engraved drill bows from the

Smithsonian collections were reanimated and contextualized through Indigenous oral histories and illustrated with heritage objects from the Carrie M. McLain Museum. The project resulted in the publication *Our Stories Etched in Ivory / Qulip'yugut Iksiaqtuumaruat Tuugaami: The Smithsonian Collection of Engraved Drill Bows with Stories from the Arctic.* A two-day book release celebration was held in August 2021 with an ivory carving demonstration and contributor book signing that drew over 100 community members.

2016-2019 Nome Archaeology Camp (Educational Outreach)

The Carrie M. McLain Memorial Museum partnered with the National Park Service (NPS) and Katirvik Cultural Center to offer place-based activities for the Nome Archaeology Camp, a field school for Alaska Native high school students in the Bering Strait and Northwest Alaska. The camp drew on local and regional experts to incorporate traditional knowledge, museum studies, wildlife biology, and history, into hands-on activities that taught students techniques to explore and appreciate the cultural and natural resources of the region. Museum activities included an Indigenous language cataloguing activity with Inupiaq elders, archival research in the collections, and 3D scanning of archaeological materials.

2015-2017 Nome: Hub of Cultures and Communities across the Bering Strait (Museum Exhibition)

A partnership with over 70 community collaborators (Alaska Native and non-Native) who participated in interviews, shared stories, and contributed materials to a series of immersive displays that blend technology with hands on interactives to inspire visitors and connect past and contemporary narratives from the Bering Strait. The phased exhibition opened in 2016 and 2017 as the inaugural exhibit in the new Carrie M. McLain Memorial Museum.

2010-2012 Community-Based Dissertation Research in Northwest Alaska

Interviews with 40 Alaska Native artists and community members in Utqiagvik, Point Hope, Kotzebue, Shishmaref, Nome, St. Michael and Anchorage who discussed ivory carvings in museum collections, shared oral histories, and provided Native terms for ethnographic objects.
